ED 7316 - Adult Development

This course examines current theories of adult development, fundamental developmental changes in adulthood, and the implications for practice in adult education.

ED 7314 - Community Development of Educators

Examines community development models and methods as relevant to the practice and scholarship of formal and non-formal education.

ED 7315 - Models of Inquiry

This course examines the philosophies informing different research epistemologies and examples of how these can be actualized methodologically. Philosophies to be analyzed include feminism and race-based theory. This course will help students see the multiple possibilities for conducting research.

ED 7354 - Intermediate Quantitative Research

Includes descriptive statistics; sampling techniques; statistical inference including the null hypothesis, significance tests, and confidence intervals; and causal-comparative analyses, including t-test and ANOVA.

Includes distinctive features, alternative qualitative

traditions, purposeful sampling, common data collection methods, inductive analysis, the role of the researcher, and evaluating qualitative research. Prerequisites: Core and Concentration courses or instructor's permission

TEACHING PHILOSOPHY STATEMENT

Teaching adults was not my professional goal, and I primarily saw myself as a learner as I tried to navigate new things in life, both personal and professional. However, as I continued to learn and apply this new knowledge, I found myself hungry for more learning and discovered that learning is a lifelong process that equips you with tools and skills to help others do the same. Educators have a passion for the profession; they teach because they want to make a difference in the life of their students and the community. Being an educator takes courage and commitment.

As an educator, I need to self-reflect and be a good listener. I must motivate, encourage, and support my students through the learning process. Ensuring students are mastering the content by giving clear objectives and hands-on activities. Provide the opportunity for students to work in teams and support each other. Provide the opportunity for questions, timely feedback, and connecting errors. Direct students to appropriate resources, set high achievement standards, and develop means to assess learning, including obtaining feedback from students on teaching styles, content, and classroom management.

Educators must recognize that "learning can be experienced in different ways--formal. non-formally, incidentally, and through tactile learning." (Rocco et al., 2021, p. 73). The role of the student in the learning process can vary depending on the outcome goal of the class or program and the educator's expectations. My preference draws from Malcolm Knowles's understanding of the development of adult self-concept, self-directed and

responsible for learning (Rocco et al., 2021). For learning to be achievable, the student must be motivated to learn and accountable for the learning process's goal attainment. Some of the successful learning practices include self-directive learning (SDL), where the learner has the responsibility for their learning pathway (Cox, 2015); experimental learning, where the learning draws from experiencing directly from the realities of the theory and transformative learning, where the learner recognizes that experience is central to the learning process (Rocco et al., 2021).

Implementing my philosophy in the classroom, students can expect to be guided through different tasks leading to content mastery, providing clear objectives, and adjusting the pace of the lecturer when needed; students will be expected to make efficient use of class time and apply learning with hands-on activities. Students come to class self-motivated, working on issues or problems without fear of failure. Students will feel supported as I provide constructive feedback with an open mind and understanding of the student's history of failure, which can result in lowered self-confidence; I will encourage the students' efforts while challenging them to do their absolute best, providing a climate of care and trust in the classroom.

As a new educator, my goal is that I will start to develop teaching practices that align with my personal values with the end goal of allowing the students to take control of their own learning and the freedom to learn what is important to them—awaking their own values and ideologies and putting knowledge into action.
